

Success Story from Claire Staines and Simone Müller

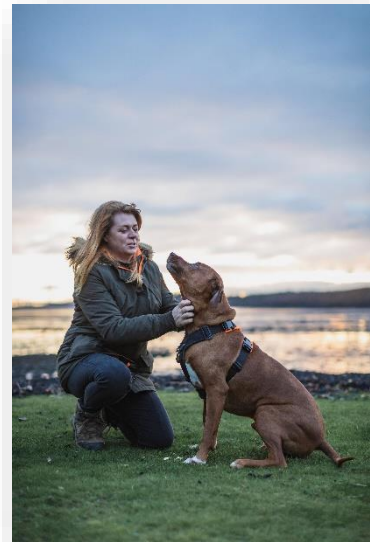

I have always had the dream of living in Scotland for a period of time and getting to know the culture. Thanks to Claire and the Erasmus Young Entrepreneurs programme, I was even able to combine this with my passion for dog training, how amazing is that! I’m grateful for this wonderful opportunity!

When I chose to apply for the Erasmus Young Entrepreneurs Programme and to ask Claire if she wanted to be my mentor, I had just finished my dog trainer

education, started a second career as a dog trainer and founded my own business. My head was full of theoretical knowledge but I hadn't found my personal way of dog training yet. I had yet to ask myself: What kind of dog trainer do I want to be?

It was clear from the start, that Claire and I shared the same values that are promoted in the EYE Programme and that we both see as an enrichment in our professional and personal lives, such as life-long learning, the exchange of best practice and the humane treatment of animals and people in our society.



During my three months with Lothlorien Dog Services near Edinburgh, I shadowed 1-2-1 lessons in the mornings, when clients came into the training centre with their dogs to work on behaviour modification programmes for fearful or aggressive dogs or for basic training, such as walking on a loose leash or recall.

In the evenings, I participated as a Co-trainer in group classes, like puppy class, teen class, trick training or focus class.

On Fridays, I shadowed Claire in her dog walking business, which basically meant that we took beautiful walks at the beach with a lovely bunch of dogs, had long conversations about humane dog training in both our countries and picked up a lot of poop.

One of my highlights was a three days visit to the wolf pack of the Royal Highland Wildlife Park in Kincaig on behalf of Lothlorien Dog Services, assisting the team of keepers in their daily routine and providing feedback on their training with the wolves.
